

BY THE NUMBERS

Wrap up / Highlights

Our stated goal for our early-spring grant applications was to double last year's total production of 2000 seedlings, 1000 units of produce and 2500 pounds of gleaned fruit. At the time it seemed a little outrageous.

So we went ahead and grew, gleaned and distributed 4000 seedlings, 3000 units of produce, and 7600 pounds of local fruit. We received more plant and produce donations from other gardeners and farmers then ever before. More visitors (\sim 15,000), more volunteers (25), and more events and workshops than in years past.

We also amassed more income from grants (\$40469.23 + 80%), from donations and rental income (\$3534.28 + 78%) and workshop admissions (\$1659.03) than last year.

If we can judge success by numbers alone, then this year has been a success.





Chickens!


OUR CHICKEN ADVENTURE

- ➤ We bought 6 chicks on March 19. People of all ages came in specifically to see the chickens, at all stages of their life. We had toddlers who loved them, teens from the SOS program next door who cuddled them, and seniors who very fondly remembered having had them as young people, back on the farm. Unfortunately, 3 of them were roosters, and we didn't get rid of them until they had already become an irritation. Somebody complained to By-law, and since we're in a Public Institutional zoning, we had to comply and remove the chickens. For the time-being.
- ➤ We can almost certainly get a variance from the City, but that would take 6 months and a \$2000 application fee. We'll come up with some plan to meet with the city to amend the by-law. We will have chickens again next spring.









VISITORS

- ➤ We can calculate approximately 15,000 unique visitors who came through the space last year, with dozens of regular visitors who come in to harvest what's available in the garden, plus many who came in for fruit, in season, and to the new pantry.
- ➤ We also have multiple regular contributors who bring their own produce to share. It's a benefit for them to have an established location to bring their excess garden produce. Shout out to Fierce Love Farms and Yvonne for regular donations
- ➤ The barrier-free model allows everybody to feel welcome to partake, without any stigma of charity. Not top-down handouts, but neighbour helping neighbour instead.



COMMUNITY PANTRY

- ➤ This pantry had lived at Gaylene's place at Moilliet and Hirst since 2021. It was funded with a PQ Foundation Neighbourhood Grant.
- ➤ It's a great opportunity to encourage mutual aid and provide non-perishables from our central location.
- ➤ We've been approved to 'shop' for food at Loaves and Fishes Food Bank, and are currently running a Fill The Pantry campaign where we match donations and purchase staples and non-perishables to distribute. We're presently going through \$150 worth of purchased food weekly

FRUIT TREE PROJECT

- ➤ We gleaned 7644 pounds of local fruit from about 75 locations thanks to 13 different volunteers, from June 24 Oct 27. Most of the fruit, 70%, was picked after Sept 1st, which leads me to suggest we mobilize the schools next year for some of the bigger orchard picks.
- ➤ About 1300 pounds from 32 different people was dropped off from homeowners who recognized us as a suitable place to bring their fruit
- ➤ At the height of fruit season, we were seeing tons of traffic from moms, seniors and families coming in for bulk amounts for canning, drying and processing.



WHAT ABOUT THE GARDEN?

- ➤ The garden is becoming very full and wellestablished. There are still a couple fruit trees to be planted. We intend to build permanent pergolas over the front picnic tables, and arched trellises between the front raised beds for grapes and climbing fruits, funding dependent.
- ➤ The north east section still has room for improvement. We'll be planting another permaculture bed and have reclaimed the north fence from the ivy and blackberries. (Thanks Franklin!)
- ➤ The west fence is to be planted with an Indigenous plant garden, spearheaded by Reina and a Neighbourhood Small Grant
- ➤ We'll only ever be able to grow a limited amount of food on the 4400 square foot, 1/10 acre site. Its best purpose is as a demonstration garden, a community space, a flagship for the group and a workshop location.

We have big ideas for the coming year and growing season.





